2		This Commission of Enquiry is now
3		reconvened.
4		First let me apologise for the late
5		start but we will however press ahead.
6		For the record, could we have the names
7		of the attorneys present, please.
8	MRS. PHILLIPS:	Sandra Minott-Phillips, instructed by
9		Myers Fletcher and Gordon for
10		Redevelopment Foundation Inc.
11	MS. CLARKE:	Judith Clarke for the Commission.
12	MR. MOODIE:	Brian Moodie and Danielle Chai
13		instructed by the firm of Samuda and
14		Johnson representing FINSAC.
15	COMM BOGLE:	Thank you very much.
16		This morning we are supposed to be
17		hearing from Mr. Campbell, Mr. Campbell
18		is supposed to be our witness today and
19		the Commission's view was that today
20		Mr. Campbell would be able to address
21		concerns that we have regarding the
22		witnesses that came before this
23		commission. In discussions with
24		Mr. Moodie he informed the Commission
25		that the questions received from

1	Mr. Levy that FINSAC has addressed those
2	and the answers to those questions are
3	here to be presented to Mr. Levy, to the
4	Commission and to Mr. Levy.
5	Regarding the other persons that gave
6	witness here to this Commission
7	Mr. Moodie informs me that he has gotten
8	most if not all of the information which
9	would address the queries or accusation
10	or whatever of the persons that gave
11	evidence here during the course of this
12	Commission. Mr. Moodie advises that
13	while the files are available, a full
14	compilation to answer the questions or
1.5	the points raised in the transcripts
16	have not yet been put together.
17	We had hoped and I think that there
18	might be some misunderstanding. We had
19	hoped that FINSAC would have been here
20	today with those so that they could
21	present the answers and be
22	cross-examined. Mr. Moodie informs that
23	FINSAC and his understanding is that
24	they would prepare a summary submission
25	addressing all of the issues that were

1.		that he read or that were raised during
2		the Enquiry so far. As such, Mr. Moodie
3		is saying that Mr. Campbell is not in a
4		position to answer questions today and
5		therefore at this time I would like to
6		ask Mr. Moodie, bearing in mind that we
7		are trying to wrap up this Enquiry and
8		we had hoped to have completed most of
9		the Enquiry regarding FINSAC this week
10		and therefore what I would like to ask
11		Mr. Moodie is how soon this week he
12		would be able to prepare, if not a full
13		final, in view of the fact that we know
1.4		that Mr. Don Crawford should be coming
15		back so he would not be able to address
16		necessarily issues in those but surely
17		issue regarding the witnesses that have
18		come and given witness at this
19		Commission, when this week he thinks
20		that he could be able to present that,
21		bearing in mind that what we wish is
22		that it be presented in the Commission,
23		in the Enquiry, in the public enquiry.
24	MR. MOODIE:	If I can, Chairman, before I answer your
25		question just to give a little

1	background.
2	The misunderstanding of which you speak
3	was based on a ruling from this
4	Commission that it would not permit
5	FINSAC to recall, because of the
6	circumstances that this Commission is
7	well aware of, it would not permit
8	FINSAC to recall any of the persons who
9	had made allegations against FINSAC.
10	In that light we made an application to
11	put in a submission based on the
12	documents which we found which would
13	address some of those allegations and
1.4	the Commission indicated that as it
15	would be permitting other counsel or
16	other parties who have appeared before
17	it to put in a final submission, that it
18	would also permit FINSAC to do so. To
19	that extent we were preparing that for
20	our final submission.
21	In relation to the evidence given by
22	Donovan Crawford, we received
23	information from Anthony Levy and we
24	sent him documentation and we have some
25	of that information to put in evidence

1		before the Commission. We have also
2		compiled information in relation to each
3		of the persons who have given evidence
4		before this the Commission and made
5		allegations against FINSAC and I think
6		perhaps by Thursday this week we will be
7		in a position to have a completed
8		submission.
9	COMM BOGLE:	When you say by Thursday, are you saying
10		you will be able to come to this
11		Commission on Thursday?
12	MR. MOODIE:	To present that submission.
13	COMM BOGLE:	To present that document?
14	MR. MOODIE:	Yes.
15	COMM BOGLE:	Mr. Moodie, on that note, what was the
16		preparation that you and Mr. Campbell
17		had made for today and tomorrow?
18	MR. MOODIE:	To answer questions from Mr. Levy who
19		indicated in writing to us that we
20		should be prepared to answer questions
21		in relation to the documents in relation
22		to Donovan Crawford. Mr. Levy wrote to
23		us, I think on three separate occasions
24		between the break and today saying here
25		are the questions we have, here are the

1		documents we have; Mr. Campbell should
2		be prepared to answer questions when he
3		next appears. We are here prepared to
4		answer those questions. And I think he
5		copied the Commission on each of those
6		letters.
7	COMM BOGLE:	Miss Clarke, do you - I am going to
8		however swear Mr. Campbell in.
9		Mr. Campbell can you please.
10	MS. CLARKE:	Yes, Mr. Chairman.
11	COMM BOGLE:	Just a minute. Yes, sir, you may
12		introduce yourself.
13	DAVE GARCIA:	Dave Garcia representing Patrick Hylton.

2	MR. MOODIE:	Chairman, if I may? Some, I think three
3		weeks ago, I invited Miss Clarke to
4		submit any questions which may not have
5		directly arisen from the transcripts on
6		behalf of persons for whom she led
7		evidence before this Commission. Miss
8		Clarke said she would do so. To date we
9		have not had any questions from her. I
10		was handed today two documents from the
11		Commission relating to two of those
12		witnesses. But certainly in respect of
13		others the only answers which we have
14		prepared would be in relation to issues
15		which were raised by those persons
16		complaining before this Commission in
17		the transcripts. So again we would
18		extend the invitation if there are any
19		additional questions we certainly would
20		intend to answer them as far as
21		possible.
22	MS. CLARKE:	Mr. Chairman, may I respond to my friend
23		first?
24	COMM BOGLE:	Sure.
25	MS. CLARKE:	Perhaps we learn daily that informal

1 discussions are sometimes unsafe because 2 I hate to say I do not recall. I have 3 never in any response to Counsel given 4 any undertaking that I would supply any 5 questions to him. In any event, and 6 I'll be very quick without getting into 7 the details of what my friend has said, 8 I indicated to him when he extended the 9 invitation, even just a few moments ago 10 that an invitation is just that because 11 one may not feel constrained to supply 12 the questions ahead of time given how 13 the matter, especially FINSAC's posture 14 has proceeded because you know FINSAC 15 has had these opportunities, they have 16 read the transcripts. Suffice it to say 17 that there are no questions which have 18 not - so far coming forth from the 19 witnesses with whom I am concerned there 20 are no questions which won't be arising 21 from the transcripts. So to the extent 22 that my friend says he invited me to put 23 questions not arising from the 2.4 transcript, I would allay his concern by 25 saying we have no questions which have

1		not arisen from the transcript. What we
2		were hoping today is that based on what
3		Mr. Campbell would have forthcoming
4		relative to these particular details,
5		these individuals, we may have further
6		questions from him, based on his further
7		evidence. But we certainly will have no
8		questions not arising from the
9		transcript or the statement. All the
10		witnesses' concerns arise from the
11		proceedings here which are reflected in
12		the transcripts.
13		As it relates to your query, Mr.
14		Chairman, I am not sure whether I
15		understand you to be saying that
16		whatever questions I have of
17	·	Mr. Campbell I should put them and then
18		if they are not addressed going forward
19		then I put them again. I am not sure
20		that is what you said.
21	COMM BOGLE:	No, no, all I am saying is that if you
22		do have any questions for Mr. Campbell
23		today you may put them to Mr. Campbell.
24		To the extent that Mr. Campbell might
25		not have the information with him today

1		I would expect that those would form
2		part of the presentation and be fully
3		addressed in the presentation.
4	MS. CLARKE:	With respect, sir, I have some
5		difficulty with that based on how the
6		matter has proceeded. It seems to me
7		that if these questions are put today
8		and it turns out that certain details
9		are not on the table as my friend has
10		said, we would be moving the wheel
11		without going forward because they would
12		have to be put again in any event.
13		Because the questions are going to be
14		very specific, they are going to call
15		for data which my friend indicated, not
16		to me in an informal discussion this
17		time but before the Commission, that he
18		would have - he had said he had pulled
19		these individual files, the data
20		relevant to these individuals would be
21		forthcoming today. So if they are not
22		present, if they are not here, I doubt
23		very much that putting the questions
24		today so that FINSAC could go and answer
25		them on some subsequent occasion would
-		or powe purpeduett occasion MONTO

1		move the matter because it may very well
2		turn out that the answers that are
3		forthcoming in these submissions which
4		were promised begs the question again.
5		So we would really like to have the
6		questions put and the questions answered
7		even for coherence in our minds because
8		for me to put the questions now for
9		FINSAC to go away, I may as well put the
10		questions so they can prepare and when I
11		have had that prepared document, then I
12		would be able to inform myself whether I
13		have any further questions, whether they
14		have been addressed; but to just put
15		them on the table, to lay them out and
16		wait for an answer to return in a
17		document, I think we are going to be
18		turning the wheel twice and not going
19		forward.
20	COMM BOGLE:	Miss Clarke, how this Commission has
21		been going over the months is that
22		regarding FINSAC and JRF and other
23		institutions, if there are questions
24		that the institution or the represent at
25		the time cannot answer then they are

questions and so this is why I am staying that if you have any questions, if they have already been addressed in the document then FINSAC will know they have been already been addressed, but what we are trying to do is to get all the questions out of the way, all the questions to FINSAC so that at least when FINSAC returns with that document and presents that document at this Hearing, that it would have covered all of the areas rather than at that time it is said that oh, I had another question and therefore I would like you to check this information. So what we are trying to do is ensure that when FINSAC comes back which is the last, as it were time, we are hoping it will be the last time, so that we can sort of come to an end outside of the fact that there might be one or two persons coming after which they might wish to address, but at the same time all the questions that we have for FINSAC, I would like the questions

1		to be addressed, put to FINSAC so that
2		they can address the questions
3		adequately.
4	MR. MOODIE:	Chairman, I think a part of the
5		rationale
6	MS. CLARKE:	I thought it was addressed to me.
7	MR. MOODIE:	I am just trying to assist, Chairman. I
8		think a part of the rationale is that in
9		terms of representation, FINSAC was
10		clearly a little late in the game and
11		therefore not being able to recall these
12		persons to cross-examine them, FINSAC
13		has opened itself up to say all the
14		questions you have, everything that
15		arises from the transcripts we will seek
16		to address in our submission. If there
17		are any questions which do not appear in
18		the transcripts please submit them to us
19		so that as you say, Chairman, once we
20		have responded based on a review of the
21		individual files, all the information
22		will be before the Commission.
23	COMM BOGLE:	Miss Clarke, were you going to respond a
24		while ago to what I said.
25	MS. CLARKE:	Yes, Mr. Chairman. My friend purported

1 to assist but I think he took us 2 elsewhere because it seems to me that 3 given all of the latitude - I hear what you said Mr. Chairman, about the format 5 being that persons are given an 6 opportunity to answer questions but now is FINSAC is here as it were, has made a submission based on my understanding, is 9 here to be cross-examined to the 10 specific issues raised by these debtors. 11 It is water under the bridge but the 12 opportunity was given and lost to FINSAC 13 to cross-examine these witnesses ad 14 nauseam at times, I am sure as we have 15 seen because the misfortune of these 16 witnesses, you know, is that given the 17 paucity of documents they had, given the 18 length of time that had passed, given 19 the mere simplicity of some of them. 20 they never had a chance to even prepare 21 themself for some of the documents that 22 were thrust upon them sometimes; to go 23 away and prepare questions based on 24 sometimes twelve, thirteen exhibits that 25 were being put at them by JRF at the

1	moment when they were being
2	cross-examined.
3	So if what you are proposing Mr.
4	Chairman, is that I put these questions
5	to await these submissions, I don't know
6	that we will have advanced the process
7	because in as much as you say that any
8	questions that may arise would be
9	addressed here and now, it may very well
10	be that in FINSAC's answer it opens up
11	the door to a lot of other questions
12	because we were hoping today to have
13	data. My friend had indicated he would
14	have produced this data before this
15	Hearing and I recall saying to him, then
16	perhaps that would inform the questions
17	I have because if certain data was
18	forthcoming then some of the questions
19	may very well be answered in the
20	documents or the data itself. So it
21	could not be that I indicated to my
22	friend that I would produce the
23	documents first. I said if you show me
24	what you have on each individual file
25	that would certainly probably put to

1		rest some of my questions.
2		Mr. Chairman I am not sure, do I know go
3		through and ask the individual questions
4		relative to issues raised by these
5		individual witnesses in the hope that
6		Mr. Campbell may be able to answer them
7		today and if he is not then he will go
8		away and prepare a submission, sir. That
9		is the position, sir.
10	COMM BOGLE:	You can or you can also submit the
11		questions to FINSAC. The thing is we
12		are not here to put anybody on trial;
13		this is not a court where we are trying
14		you know. What we are trying to do is
15		to get information and get at the
16		truth. This what we are trying to get.
17		Now FINSAC has a lot of information at
18		their office and when we ask FINSAC
19		questions, what we are asking the
20		representative of FINSAC to do is to
21		provide the information to us. And so
22		when we ask questions or we send FINSAC
23		questions we expect that the
24		organization, FINSAC the organization
25		will address those questions, those

7 concerns fully backing them up with 2 whatever documentation they might have 3 so that we can be provided with the truth about it. So the idea when we 5 send questions to FINSAC is allow them 6 the opportunity to dig their files 7 because we do not want Mr. Campbell to 8 come here and guess and guess. 9 The first as appearance of Mr. Campbell, 10 Mr. Campbell did not have the answers to 11 a lot of the questions. Since then we 12 have informed Mr. Campbell on more than 13 one occasion that when he comes here he 14 is to come with the responses to the 15 questions and any documentation he might 16 have to back up, that, and that is the 17 reason why we sends information to 18 FINSAC. We do not have Mr. Campbell on 19 trial. We do not have anybody on trial 20 here. This is not a court, this is an 21 enquiry. We are trying to get 22 information and whatever route I think 23 or the Commission thinks that we should 24 use to get the information then we are 25 going to do that and we are asking

1		FINSAC at this time to address as fully
2		as possible all of the points raised by
3		the persons who came and gave evidence
4		in this Commission and they address them
5		is fully as possible so that the
6		Commission can look at them and come to
7		some understanding based on what the
8		witnesses said and what FINSAC has to
9		say.
10	MR. MOODIE:	I just wish to point out, Chairman, that
11		in every case where the Commission has
12		put questions to FINSAC that FINSAC has
13		answered those questions and provided
14		the relevant information.
15		The last documents outstanding were the
16		Minutes of Board Meetings of FINSAC and
17		associated companies and we handed those
18		over several weeks ago. So the only
19		information outstanding from FINSAC
20		which FINSAC could provide would be in
21		relation to those specific debtors which
22		is why asked for questions in the event
23		that the transcripts - because the
24		information we have so far addresses the
25		allegations raised in the transcripts.

1		Some of them are just peripheral, some
2		are material allegations but we address
3		them in our search for documents.
4	MS. CLARKE:	Is my friend saying that Mr. Campbell
5		would be able to answer some of them
6		this morning if they are put him?
7	MR. MOODIE:	I think that has already be said.
8	MS. CLARKE:	I would just like to hear what the
9		answer is, if it is yes or no.
10	COMM BOGLE:	No.
11	MS. CLARKE:	In that case, Mr. Chairman, if I have an
12		option to send the questions I would
13		want to exercise that option.
14	COMM BOGLE:	Thank you very much. Please do.
15		Mr. Moodie you handed me two documents
16		here.
17	MR. MOODIE:	Yes.
18	COMM BOGLE:	One, Properties owned by Donovan
19		Crawford and connected parties/
20		companies-unsold; the other, Assets
21		formerly owned by Donovan Crawford &
22		connected parties/companies - sold.
23		Would you like to tender them in
24		evidence this morning?
25	MR. MOODIE:	Certainly. This relates to evidence

1		given by Mr. Donovan Crawford before the
2		Commission. In that evidence he had
3		made certain allegations, he had given a
4		list of personal family properties and
5		assets sold which he alleges were sold
6		well below fair market value. We have
7		in fact unearthed a list of the
8		properties which were indeed sold and we
9		have before the Commission a list of
10		those properties, the current market
11		value, the force sale value, the actual
12		sale price, the net amounts received and
13		any explanation where due as to what
14		occurred with any balances. So I would
15		ask Mr. Campbell to if possible start
16		with the assets formerly owned by
17		Donovan Crawford and connected parties.
18	MS. CLARKE:	Sorry, before you move a along from my
19		particular concern, Mr. Chairman I am
20		just wondering, given that Mr. Moodie
21		has indicated that he would have the
22		relevant submission by Thursday, I am
23		just wondering whether in the spirit of
24		how we have been proceeding whether I'll
25		have those submission before hand so

1		that I can determine with some precision
2		whether the questions put have been
3		addressed before I actually arrive here.
4		In other words I wish that they are not
5		being handed to me when I am sitting
6		down because then I may need time to
7		read and see if all the questions raised
8		by these seven or eight persons have
9		been addressed.
10	MR. MOODIE:	The submissions will be ready by
11		Thursday.
12	MS. CLARKE:	Are we going to be sitting on Thursday?
13	COMM BOGLE:	No, we will not, so we will address that
14		shortly. But the fact that it will be
15		ready on Thursday means that we will get
16		it on Thursday but we will discuss when
17		we will meet.
18	MS. CLARKE:	Very well, sir.
19	MR. MOODIE:	Mr. Campbell might I ask you to start
20		with the property identified as Strata
21		Lot 10, Sterling Castle, St. Andrew
22		(Apartment) and to proceed along the
23		list of properties indicating what the
24		records of FINSAC reveal in terms of the
25		market value, sale price and certainly

1		any allegation of Mr. Crawford as to
2		gross under value.
3	A:	Item 1 on the list of assets formerly
4		owned that were sold, strata
5		lot, this is an apartment, Sterling
6		Castle would give you the title
7		reference, the previous registered
8		owner, the valuation we had was J\$2.6,
9		with a forced sale value of \$2.2 and
10		this was sold for \$2.25 million. This
11		is a legal spread sheet we are on, item
12		number 1.
13	COMM. BOGLE:	The only thing I would have loved which
14		is a problem we have been having from
15		the outset is who carried out the
16		valuation, that is a concern we have
17		had.
18	A:	I will adjust the spread sheet and
19		re-submit it but these valuations were
20		done by Allison Pitter & Company.
21	Q:	Are copies of the valuation available?
22	A:	Copies of the valuations are available
23		and the if the Commission wishes we
24		could submit copies.
25	Q:	We will send them over to you this

1		afternoon.
2	A:	Okay.
3	Q:	Strata Lot number 1 Sterling Castle, Red
4		Hills, St. Andrew?
5	A:	Strata Lot number 1, this is also an
6		apartment, it is on the same complex
7		with number 10 and that lot valued at
8		\$4.8 Million, forced sale value of \$4
9		million and it was sold for \$4 million.
10	COMM. ROSS:	What is 'FSV'?
11	A:	Forced sale value, and 'CMV' is current
12		market value.
13		Item number 3 in Parottee, Black River,
14		this is land only, the market value we
15		had on that one was \$2.3 million with a
16		forced sale of \$1.7 million; this one
17		was sold at the auction, the value we
18		got was \$4 million.
19		Item number 4 which is a parcel of land
20		at Runaway Bay, land only, this one was
21		jointly owned by Donovan and Claudine
22		Crawford, market value \$6.8 million,
23		forced sale value of \$5 million and this
24		was sold for \$5.3 million.
25		Now under net receipt there is a figure

1		of \$2.2 million, the total net proceeds
2		were \$4.4 and the difference of \$2.2
3		million is due to Mrs. Crawford, however
4		this has not been paid because
5		subsequent to them being advised that
6		this property was sold at the auction,
7		Donovan Crawford attempted to sell his
8		fifty percent share in the property to
9		his wife, Claudine Crawford, so they
10		were cited for contempt of court and the
11		net proceeds due to her are being held
12		to cover those costs.
13	Q:	In relation to item number 5, I take you
14		there, Strata Lot number 11, Fisherman's
15		Point, Mr. Crawford gave evidence that
16		the approximate sale price, I think he
17		indicated that he wasn't sure where he
18		got the information from, was \$4.4
19		million, the appraised market value was
20		\$6.5 million and the shortfall or loss
21		to him of \$2.1 million and I am reading
22		from Mr. Crawford's submission. Could
23		you indicate what the records have
24		revealed in relation to that property?
25	A:	Strata Lot number 11, Fisherman's Point

1		number 6 or 11?
2	Q:	Number 5?
3	A:	Okay, Strata Lot 11, Fisherman's Point,
4		St. Ann, this is an apartment again, the
5		valuation was \$6.2, a forced sale value
6		of \$5.4 and this was sold for \$5.4. Net
7		proceeds again \$2.4 million, because 50%
8		percent had to be paid to joint owner
9		Claudine Crawford.
10	COMM. BOGLE:	That was paid?
11	A:	That was paid.
12	Q:	In respect of the item number 6, Strata
13		Lot 41, Fisherman's Point, Mr. Crawford
14		gave evidence that the approximate sale
15		price as far as he understood it was
16		\$5.5 million while the appraised or
17		market value was \$98 million and
18		therefore he alleged a shortfall or loss
19		to himself of \$44 million. Could you
20		indicate what the records of FINSAC have
21		revealed in relation to that property?
22	A:	Strata number 41 at Fisherman's Point,
23		an apartment, the valuation was J\$6.6
24		million, forced sale value of \$5.8 and
25		this was sold for \$5.8 and the full net

1		proceeds came to FINSAC.
2	Q:	Thank you. Please continue with item
3		number 7?
4	A:	Item 7, this is strata lot at Ocean
5		Towers, an apartment
6	Q:	In relation to that, just to break you
7		Mr. Campbell, Mr. Crawford gave evidence
8		that in relation to that property, its
9		status was unknown to him but the
10		appraised or market value was two
11		hundred and fifty million Jamaican
12		dollars and he alleges that he lost
13		twenty-two million dollars. Could you
14		indicate what the records of FINSAC have
15		shown in relation to that property?
16	A:	Strata lot at Ocean Towers, the market
17		value was \$5.8 million and the forced
18		sale value of \$5 million and this one
19		was sold for \$6 million and I should
20		just indicate for the record that for
21		these seven properties, one to seven on
22		this list, the titles originally were
23		held or under the control of
24		Mr. Crawford and at the time when FINSAC
25		attempted to sell them the titles were

1		not released to FINSAC, so we had to
2		apply for new ones so in a recent letter
3		from Mr. Levy who represents
4		Mr. Crawford, there would have been
5		other title references for these seven
6		properties, but these are the new titles
7		we had obtained in order to proceed with
8		the sale.
9		Item number 8, Lot 4, Vantage View
10		Estate, this is land only, I think
11		Mr. Crawford referred to it with a
12		property with house.
13	COMM. BOGLE:	You applied for new titles?
14	A:	So these title references are the new
15		titles.
16	COMM. BOGLE:	You didn't get duplicates?
17	A:	Typically they give you a new volume and
18		folio number.
19		Item number 8, Lot 4, Vantage View
20		Estate, this is land only, valuation
21		\$1.8, forced sale \$1.5, this was sold
22		for \$1.5 million.
23		Lot 1, Sterling Castle, this is a
24		townhouse; valuation was \$14 million,
25		forced sale value of \$11 million, this

1		was sold for \$12.5 million.
2	Q:	In relation to item 10, 122 Constant
3		Spring Road, Mr. Crawford in his
4		evidence alleged that the approximate
5		sale price was \$57 million but he has
6		here as the market value \$2.5 million.
7	A:	Must be US dollars probably.
8	Q:	Perhaps and he quotes the shortfall or
9		loss to himself of one hundred and
10		seventy million Jamaican dollars. Could
11		you kindly indicate what your records
12		have revealed in relation to that
13		property?
14	A:	Item number 10, 122 Constant Spring
15		Road, four titles that comprise that
16		property, the valuation was \$48 million
17		with a forced sale value of \$42.5
18		million, and this was sold for \$57.75
19		million. In the case of this one there
20		is a prior charge on the property so
21		twenty two of the net proceeds had to be
22		paid to Pelican Investments Limited,
23		FINSAC received the difference of twenty
24		six million.
25	Q:	In respect of 1 Paddington Terrace,

1		Mr. Crawford supplied little information
2		or no information in regard to the
3		approximate sale price but he said the
4		market value according to him was \$1.8
5		million, I suppose that would be in US
6		dollars, and he alleges that the short-
7		fall or loss to him was \$156 million
8		Jamaican dollars. Could you please
9		indicate what the records of FINSAC in
10		relation to 1 Paddington Terrace reveal?
11	A:	1 Paddington Terrace, two titles
12		comprise that property, it was owned by
13		Regardless Limited, the valuation,
14		current market value was J\$56 million
15		with a forced sale value of \$49.3
16		million, this was sold for \$60.25
17		Million. Full net proceeds came to
18		FINSAC.
19	COMM. ROSS:	Can I ask, the net proceeds seem to be
20		considerably less than the sale price,
21		could you give some sort of explanation
22		for that please? Seven million dollars
23		in the case
24	MR. MOODIE:	Chairman, I would think that it would be
25		so because you have to deduct the fees.

1	COMM. ROSS:	I am just asking for the explanation.
2	MR. MOODIE:	Certainly.
3	A:	We will submit to this commission a copy
4		of the statements of accounts to show
5		the deductions, we can submit that but
6		primarily it's transfer tax and stamp
7		duties.
8	Q:	And associated fees, attorney fees
9		etcetera. Please continue with the
10		list.
11	A:	So those are the properties that were
12		sold. There are four other items on
13		here that are not properties in the
14		strictest sense, real estate, that is
15		Guardian Life policy, originally Mutual
16		Life and the net proceeds from that
17		\$658,827, it was paid over to FINSAC.
18		There was some Bank of Nova Scotia
19		ordinary shares and these were sold and
20		\$4.17 million is the net proceeds.
21		There is 1931 Buick motorcar, I realize
22		now that I left out a little information
23		on here, I will adjust it, the market
24		value on there was \$800,000 with a
25		forced sale value of \$680,000 and it was

1		sold for \$801,000. My apologies, I will
2		do the adjustment.
3	COMM. BOGLE:	Repeat.
4	A:	Market value was \$800,000, forced sale
5		\$680,000 and the sale price was
6		\$801,000. This is something that was
7		sold by the bailiff of the courts and
8		the net proceeds of \$676,000 was paid to
9		us. And I am realizing there is an
10		error in line number 15, I am just
11		realizing it, my apologies. The item
12		here should be rental, the last line
13		number 15, it should be rental and this
14		rental relates to property number 9,
15		property which is at number 9, a
16		townhouse and also item number 10, so
17		where I have 11 here it should be 10, so
18		it is rental for 1 Sterling Castle,
19		townhouse
20	COMM. BOGLE:	9 and 10?
21	A:	Yes, 9 and 10. And the \$1.9 million
22		relates to that. Now having said all of
23		this, in a letter that was sent to
24		FINSAC dated June 28 by Mr. Levy, he
25		mentioned that there are a number of

1		other properties, properties that I
2		wasn't aware of personally, so we are in
3		the process of compiling an extended
4		list of properties sold which we will
5		submit to you later this week.
6	COMM. ROSS:	Mr. Campbell, can you just remind us the
7		basis on which these sales were taking
8		place, in other words, were there
9		mortgages, was there a court order, what
10		was it that gave rise to the sale of
11		these properties?
12	A:	The court order. The Commissioners will
13		recall that following the intervention
14		of the government into Century and the
15		financial sector generally, but Century
16		National Bank, an action was brought
17		against Mr. Crawford and some connected
18		parties for their management of the bank
19		and following the decision in the lower
20		court and at the Privy Council a ruling
21		was made for Mr. Crawford and others to
22		make payments, something in the region
23		of between \$2.5 and \$3 billion J dollars
24		plus interest. Subsequently, and during
25		the process leading up to that final

1		decision an affidavit would have been
2		provided by him with a list of his
3		assets, so we had that information, so
4		after the decision an application was
5		made to the courts seeking an order to
6		sell the properties and the order was
7		obtained, so on that basis we then
8		proceeded to sell.
9	COMM. BOGLE:	Item number 4, back to the 50% due but
10		held for fees, those fees have not been
11		ascertained as yet?
12	A:	The fees have been ascertained, it's
13		actually \$853,000 which are fees to
14		FINSAC and a total of \$1.5 million which
15		is supposed to be paid to the court.
16		Neither of the two has been paid.
17	MR. MOODIE:	Any further questions on these? I think
18		Chairman it is clear that the
19		information given by Mr. Crawford in
20		respect of each of the property,
21		certainly in relation to the properties
22		that are covered here by the records of
23		FINSAC, the records demonstrate that the
24		information given by Mr. Crawford is
25		less than accurate. Certainly in some

1		cases the records show that sale prices
2		in excess of the valuation was obtained
3		by FINSAC in disposing of the
4		properties. I think if I recall
5		Mr. Crawford had alleged that FINSAC
6		deliberately tried to under-sell some of
7		his properties so as to keep him as a
8		debtor but certainly I think that the
9		records have shown that in dealing with
10		the properties, certainly ordinary
11		banking principles were followed by
12		FINSAC in their disposal. There are
13		still a number of properties which have
14		not yet been disposed of and that is in
15		the other document which you have been
16		given. And these documents have also
17		been provided to Mr. Crawford's attorney
18		who indicated he wished to be here today
19		to pose questions on those documents. I
20		don't yet see him, but certainly we will
21		be willing to receive any questions he
22		may have based on what the documents
23		have shown.
24	COMM. ROSS:	Can you tell us something about the
25		list, Mr. Campbell, it says some titles

1		seem to be held by JRF, some by Attorney
2		General Chambers, some by FINSAC, can
3		you tell us a little about this?
4	A:	Sure. Let me start with the JRF ones.
5		These are some titles that inadvertently
6		were placed with Jamaican Redevelopment
7		Foundation and we intend to recall them
8		at some point but because there is a
9		difficulty in selling the properties
10		anyway we have not pursued it. These
11		are some apartments up at Sterling
12		Castle, I believe they are occupied. In
13		relation to the ones that are held by
14		Attorney General Chambers well, let
15		me start with item number 1, this one is
16		Mr. Crawford's house up at Sterling
17		Castle. Initially we had a difficulty
18		in gaining access to obtain an
19		up-to-date valuation so we have not been
20		able to sell it and we have not pursued
21		it since. And item number 7
22	COMM. BOGLE:	Is it occupied?
23	A:	We are not sure. Last time we went up
24		there, there was somebody there but we
25		are not sure if there is any arrangement

1		with Mr. Crawford.
2	COMM. BOGLE:	The thing is if the house is unoccupied,
3		then we know that the house is
4		deteriorating and the question is, you
5		said originally you were not able to get
6		access but I assumed you have gotten
7		access to it now and so one would have
8		hoped that you would make the effort to
9		sell if that is the case rather than the
10		property being there and we all know
11		that properties like that deteriorate
12		which accrue to no one's benefit,
13		neither to FINSAC nor Mr. Crawford.
14	A:	We have not pursued the matter, Mr.
15		Commissioner.
16	COMM. BOGLE:	So, you have not pursued the matter,
17		why?
18	A:	There are discussions being held with
19		Mr. Crawford on the whole matter of
20		further sale so until those discussions
21		are resolved no further sale will take
22		place.
23	COMM. BOGLE:	Don't follow that.
24	A:	I do not wish to say more on that at
25		this point, Mr. Commissioner, but

1		discussions are being held with
2		Mr. Crawford and until those discussions
3		are
4	COMM. BOGLE:	What discussions? Mr. Crawford came to
5		this Commission and he has made
6		accusations and all of these properties
7		form part of the general accusations and
8		you are saying that the properties are
9		there but you don't wish to say anything
10		about the property?
11	MR. MOODIE:	Mr. Chairman, might I ask. Were
12		attempts made to sell item number 1, Lot
13		2A and 5 Sterling Castle?
14	A:	No, because we were not able to get an
15		up-to-date valuation. We wouldn't have a
16		basis on which to sell so we did not
17		attempt to sell.
18	COMM. BOGLE:	But you have said you have gained access
19		now, so are you making any arrangement
20		to have the place valued so that it can
21		be sold?
22	A:	No, we have not gained access, we were
23		able to look from next door because the
24		gate is closed, so we have not gained
25		access, so we are not able to send in a

1		valuator to look at the property so a
2		valuation can be obtained.
3	COMM. BOGLE:	You are saying the property is just
4		there, somebody might be occupying the
5		property
6	A:	May very well be, but this is
7		Mr. Crawford's property.
8	COMM. BOGLE:	No, sir, the title may have
9		Mr. Crawford's name on it but
10		Mr. Crawford does not have access to it
11		because based on what I understand, the
12		courts have given instructions based on
13		assets that have been identified, that
14		these should be sold to take care of the
15		debts of Mr. Crawford and therefore, if
16		this forms part of that, it can't be
17		just sitting there, it belongs to
18		Mr. Crawford and just sits there, surely
19		if Mr. Crawford knew that he had it and
20		can do anything he wants, he would have
21		sold it, so clearly he can't so it
22		cannot be a matter that it is his so it
23		can just sit there. It's either that Mr.
24		Crawford going to get it or FINSAC going
25		to sell it so it can pay part of the

1		moneys that FINSAC can use to pay down
2		the debt of FINSAC, rather than it just
3		sitting there in no man's land.
4	A:	We will have another look at it
5		Mr. Chairman.
6	COMM. BOGLE:	That is really not comforting, Mr.
7		Campbell.
8	MR. MOODIE:	I think though, Chairman, if I recall
9		Mr. Campbell indicated that there was an
10		order for sale in relation to the
11		property which means that if they were
12		occupied, FINSAC would have to sell them
13		subject to their occupation, I don't
14		know that there would have been any
15		order giving possession of the premises
16		over to FINSAC so its efforts to sell
17		would certainly be subject to its
18		ability to get a valuation and to find
19		someone who is willing to buy it in the
20		condition it is at the time.
21	COMM. BOGLE:	But as far as I know Mr. Moodie, if
22		there is a problem then we go back to
23		the court and say we have a problem, we
24		can't get access because of whatever and
25		seek orders that will be necessary to

1		enable us to take possession or go in
2		and do the valuation, I mean it is for
3		us or FINSAC surely to do what is
4		necessary to have the matter dealt with
5		so that sale can be made and you know,
6		as we know FINSAC has a lot of debts
7		that the taxpayers have to bear and
8		therefore if this is to be sold then it
9		needs to be sold so it can go towards
10		the debt, so we would ask Mr. Campbell
11		to sort of not just let it sit there.
12	A:	Okay Mr. Chairman.
13	COMM. BOGLE:	You mentioned, you didn't comment on it,
14		but you mentioned that the other page,
15		two to six, that the titles were sent to
16		Jamaican Redevelopment in an error, an
17		error?
18	A:	Yes.
19	COMM. BOGLE:	And you intend to retrieve it one of
20		these days. I would have imagined than
21		once the error was found out you would
22		have retrieved it and efforts again
23		would have been made to dispose of them?
24	A:	Yes.
25	COMM. BOGLE:	But you don't see the necessity for that

1		Mr. Campbell?
2	MR. MOODIE:	Chairman, if I can assist, I think the
3		evidence has already been given before
4		this Commission that in terms of the
5		security which would certainly include
6		the title, that FINSAC has someone
7		posted, resident in the vault that is
8		shared with JRF so I don't think it's an
9		issue of retrieval, certainly if there
10		is someone to buy the property.
11	COMM. BOGLE:	Mr. Moodie, it is a matter of retrieval.
12	MR. MOODIE:	The share of the vault Mr. Chairman?
13	COMM. BOGLE:	What I am saying to you, where are the
14		others titles that FINSAC own, where are
15		they held?
16	MR. MOODIE:	Mr. Campbell?
17	A:	Some are at FINSAC in FINSAC's offices,
18		in vaults and others are
19	COMM. BOGLE:	That has to be the question, so FINSAC
20		has vaults, so why hasn't FINSAC got all
21		of the titles that FINSAC should have in
22		FINSAC's vault. The fact that someone,
23		we went through that matter already, the
24		fact of someone being at FINSAC, at JRF,
25		I am sorry, sitting down to count

1		titles, two per day, we went through
2		that already.
3	MR. MOODIE:	I don't know that that was the evidence.
4	MRS. PHILLIPS:	I don't recall two per day at all.
5	COMM. BOGLE:	I withdraw the two per day, as I said
6		before the person sitting there and
7		Mr. Campbell could not say what really
8		the person does more than sign off when
9		a title is removed or needed for
10		inspection and I remember when we were
11		going through that I said is that all
12		that the person does and it appears that
13		that is all the person actually does.
14	MR. MOODIE:	My only point Chairman, is that there
15		would be no difficulty in retrieving the
16		titles when necessary.
17	COMM. BOGLE:	The question is further than that, what
18		is being done about the sale of them,
19		that is the continuing question about
20		it, Mr. Campbell.
21	A:	The decision has been made not to sell
22		them at this time Mr. Chairman and in
23		particular item number seven which is
24		Mr. Crawford's mother's residence, and
25		these four, these five are adjoining,

1		the decision was made some time ago by
2		FINSAC's board to give her a lifetime
3		interest in occupying it, so as a result
4		the decision has been taken not to sell
5		at this time.
6	COMM. BOGLE:	Occupied by whom?
7	A:	Mr. Crawford's mother, item number 7 and
8		2 to 6 are adjoining.
9	COMM. BOGLE:	I thought Mr. Crawford's mother lives
10		with Mr. Crawford, he pointed that out
11		to us.
12	A:	At the time when the submission was made
13		to us, she lived at this premises and as
14		and when she visited Jamaica this is
15		where she resides.
16	COMM. BOGLE:	My question as I said before, it's not
17		that I am trying to get you to sell what
18		should not be sold, but my point is that
19		FINSAC has a lot of liabilities and part
20		of that liability, the taxpayers have to
21		bear and so to the extent that there are
22		properties that FINSAC should sell, then
23		I am saying why not sell them so that
24		the pressure on the public's purse might
25		be reduced.

1	A:	We agree totally Mr. Chairman but as I
2		said the decision was made to give the
3		mother a lifetime interest in those
4		properties and as a result the
5		properties have not been sold.
6	COMM. BOGLE:	And this would be a decision made by
7		FINSAC, not by the court?
8	A:	FINSAC.
9	COMM. BOGLE:	Okay continue.
10	A:	Items 8 to 20, properties at Carinosa,
11		apartments at Carinosa, apartments and
12		townhouses, that is part of the whole
13		Enchanted Gardens property and over the
14		years those properties have
15		deteriorated. We have not been able to
16		sell it based on the existing condition
17		it is in. We know, however, that the
18		common area in the complex was recently
19		sold, fixed up and sold, so we are kind
20		
21		of expecting that the person who bought
		that will probably express an interest
22		in the apartments, so we expect in the
23		very near future we should be able to
24		get sale for these.
25	COMM. BOGLE:	So, shortly they won't have much value.

1	A:	Right now there isn't much value.
2	COMM. BOGLE:	It's deteriorating?
3	A:	Yes.
4	COMM. BOGLE:	Continuously?
5	A:	Yes.
6	COMM. BOGLE:	That is what happens to unoccupied,
7		unused properties.
8	A:	Yes, sir.
9	COMM. BOGLE:	Yes.
10	A:	Items 21 and 22, we had gone to the
11		auction with those, we listed them with
12		realtors, brokers, we have not gotten
13		any offers, I suppose like others we
14		will need to get fresh valuation and go
15		back to see if we can find any
16		purchasers.
17		Item 22 to 26, Drax Hall, on a number of
18		occasions we have tried to sell those,
19		we just haven't gotten any offers in
20		line with the valuation we have. Shaw
21		Park, oh, that is one of the Carinosa
22		units, item number 26. And the three
23		vehicles, 28 to 30, these are being held
24		at FINSAC, they are ready to be sold by
25		the bailiff of the court.

1	COMM. ROSS:	So Mr. Campbell, just backtrack again to
2		the lots in Drax Hall, I don't know when
3		you got the court ruling but
4	A:	2006.
5	COMM. ROSS:	It is since 2006 you have been trying to
6		sell these properties?
7	A:	We have gotten offers on occasions but
8		below what the acceptable figure is so
9		as a result we have not accepted them.
10	COMM. ROSS:	What is the interest cost of holding
11		out?
12	A:	Well
13	COMM. ROSS:	What interest, what the court had set
14		for the \$2.5 billion?
15	A:	The US dollars debts were at eight
16		percent and J dollars was something like
17		thirty percent or little above that.
18	COMM. ROSS:	In two and a half years, you would have
19		effectively lost whatever you were
20		holding out for.
21	A:	At the same time we did not want to be
22		accused of underselling so we had to
23		weigh the situation.
24	COMM. ROSS:	If you sell at auction
25	A:	We went to the auction and did not get

1		any offer, so we are down to private
2		treaties, the properties are listed with
3		the brokers we have and from time to
4		time persons go into them, express an
5		interest and submit it to us, if it is
6		in line with the forced sale we accept
7		it, if not we decline.
8	COMM. ROSS:	It sounds like we are losing competition
9		to me, and to the debtors as well, I
10		mean it's in his interest to have these
11		things sold at the best prices as
12		quickly as possible.
13	A:	And I agree with that and for us the
14		best price must be within the forced
15		sale value, failing that I don't know
16		that we want to proceed, but, we may
17		look at it again.
18	COMM. BOGLE:	May I suggest that as long well most
19		of these are lots any way but when it
20		comes to the townhouses or homes, that
21		those deteriorate.
22	A:	All of Enchanted Gardens have
23		deteriorated.
24	COMM. BOGLE:	And continue to deteriorate.
25	A:	And continue so to do.

1	COMM. BOGLE:	One of these days you might have to give
2		them away or pay somebody to take them
3		from you.
4	A:	One never knows, you might just find a
5		man who might express an interest,
6		FINSAC has an adjoining piece of land.
7	COMM. BOGLE:	I just get the impression though
8		Mr. Campbell, quite frankly, that there
9		is not any urgency, no urgency to deal
10		with these properties and I think that
11		as Commissioner Ross said it's really
12		unfair to Mr. Crawford and surely it is
13		also unfair to us as taxpayers for these
1.4		properties to be there and for us not to
15		do something about it, it seems like we
16		sort of have an attitude, one of these
17		days somebody might come forward to
18		purchase it and at that time we will
19		consider it.
20	A:	Well, the last valuation we had on these
21		was some time ago, we could look at
22		trying to sell again, the market is
23		improving somewhat so maybe now is a
24		good time.
25	COMM. BOGLE:	I can't advise you.

1	A:	I am not suggesting that you advise me.
2	COMM. BOGLE:	I am suggesting that we could make a
3		concerted effort to liquidate these
4		assets so that the liabilities of, and I
5		come back to the liabilities, of the
6		taxpayers may be reduced.
7	A:	Yes.
8	MR. MOODIE:	Could I ask Chairman that these two
9		documents be entered into evidence, I am
10		not sure of the number, I would ask
11		Mr. DePeralto to assist us or perhaps we
12		could assign it some number further to
13		his check, but certainly an EC
14		nomination would be appropriate, EC,
15		Errol Campbell.
16	COMM. BOGLE:	All right, could we at this time give it
17		number EC 7/11, it will not be in
18		accordance with what we have before but
19		just to identify this.
20	MR. MOODIE:	So the first one therefore, assets
21		formerly owned by Donovan Crawford and
22		connected parties/companies which were
23		sold.
24	COMM. BOGLE:	7/11.
25	MR. MOODIE:	7/11 A and B? Properties owned by

1		Donovan Crawford 7/11A and unsold
2		properties 7/11B.
3	COMM. BOGLE:	Yes 7/11B. So it is A and B. These are
4		not the only documents that you have to
5		present?
6	A:	These are the documents which we thought
7		would be necessary given the allegation
8		of Mr. Crawford and particularly in
9		response to the request from Mr. Levy.
10		Again Mr. Levy indicated that he wanted
11		to pose questions to us based on these
12		documents and we were prepared to answer
13		them this morning which we are here to
14		do but unfortunately I do not see
15		Mr. Levy so we are in your hands.
16	COMM. BOGLE:	Neither do we, we do not see Mr. Levy.
17	MR. DESULME:	Mr. Chairman, I just spoke to Mr. Levy,
18		he is on his way.
19	COMM. BOGLE:	Okay, he is on his way. We will have our
20		usual coffee break. If he comes then,
21		if not we will have to adjourn at this
22		point. We will have our ten minute
23		coffee break.
24		COFFEE BREAK
25		ON RESUMPTION AT 11:28 A.M.

1	COMM. BOGLE:	Ladies and gentlemen, this Enquiry is
2		now reconvened.
3		Mr. Campbell, just to remind you that
4		you are still under oath.
5	MR. CAMPBELL:	Yes, sir.
6	COMM. BOGLE:	Mr. Campbell, just one or two questions.
7		the Exhibit EC 7/11(a), that's the one
8		that had the properties sold and the
9		dates that you have in the right hand
10		column, what does that represent, the
11		date that they were sold like 7th of
12		February '07, the first one?
13	A:	Yes, with the exception of number 9, the
14		others are the dates sold, number 9 is
15		the date when we received the net
16		proceeds.
17	COMM. BOGLE:	And you said you had valuations for
18		these properties?
19	A:	Yes, we do.
20	COMM. BOGLE:	The valuations would be roughly around
21		the same period that they were sold?
22	A:	Yes, the Court Order I believe was in
23		the region of May/June 2006. So we had
24		the auction in July 2006 so the
25		valuations would have been around that

1		period, yes.
2	COMM. BOGLE:	Swing over to EC 7 11(b) now. You
3		mentioned at Item 7 that the residence
4		there FINSAC had decided to allow
5		Mr. Crawford's mother to remain in
6		occupancy of the property until death do
7		us part?
8	A:	Yes.
9	COMM. BOGLE:	Was this sort of consideration given to
10		other persons that had their residences,
11		old people or any other, do you know of
12		any other case that this was done?
13	A:	No, I am not aware of any other case.
14		But bear in mind that FINSAC sold the
15		loan in 2002, so we only managed it for
16		a short three-year period.
17	COMM. BOGLE:	But what gave rise to this special
18		consideration on this occasion?
19	A:	I really cannot speak to that, Mr.
20		Chairman. This would have been a
21		decision made at the Board level.
22	COMM. BOGLE:	You know, in view of the fact that you
23		will be coming back, can you just do
24		that research for me.
25	A:	Yes, sir.

1	COMM. BOGLE:	You would have, I am sure, an idea of
2		about when and so you can probably check
3		the Board minutes.
4	A:	Oh yes, I can check the Board minutes.
5	COMM. BOGLE:	I am just curious you see to find out
6		why this special consideration while
7		there were other persons during the
8		period when FINSAC had loans that their
9		only residence was disposed of or
10		transferred, well, not transferred,
11		disposed of and I do not know of any
12		other occasion when FINSAC was this kind
13		and understanding. I am just trying to
14		find out what would have informed this
15		kindness.
16	A:	I will look to see what information is
17		in the minutes on the matter, Mr.
18		Chairman.
19	COMM. BOGLE:	The other thing is - continuing on that,
20		you said that the lots 1, 2, 5, 6 were
21		adjoining lots to 7 and therefore those
22		were not put on the market; those were
23		the ones with the titles at JRF. Now, I
24		would presume and clearly it is so that
25		those other lots have their own titles

7 and all that, why would you join it to 2 the residence and not sell it, because 3 they have their own titles and so I would imagine that we could sell those. 5 Why have we tied it? You see, there is 6 something not too clear. Why in the first instance that we have decided 8 outside of the court order that this 9 lady should stay in the property until 10 whenever and at the same time, we have 11 now tied five other lots to this 12 property. I can't see why this was done, 13 and I would love for you to explain. 14 Because again, I say this represents 15 one; as far I know is a court order, and 16 therefore the court order should be 17 carried out. So we are really not 18 carrying out the court order, which is 19 wrong in the first instance. 20 And number two, we have lots here that 21 we should be selling to reduce the 22 burden of the taxpayers, but we are not 23 really doing that at all. So we are 24 just sitting down on these properties 25 that should be sold. So I really would

1		like you to answer those questions for
2		me.
3	MR. MOODIE:	I was going to also ask, Chairman,
4		whether Mr. Campbell could give any
5		indication as to whether the approach to
6		dispose some of these properties has
7		taken into account any other
8		considerations; but I think you have
9		asked the question and certainly I will
10		allow Mr. Campbell to address it.
11	A:	Mr. Chairman, Commissioners, I
12		understand that Mr. Crawford has made
13		representation to the present Government
14		in relation to some kind of assistance
15		to his ailing mother and as a result a
16		legal opinion has been sought from our
17		former attorneys in relation to the
18		whole matter and pending that opinion
19		the decision was taken not to sell any
20		further properties.
21	COMM. BOGLE:	That is unacceptable, Mr. Campbell.
22		Mr. Crawford made some representation to
23		the Government, then what instruction
24		has the Government given to FINSAC?
25	A:	We are awaiting an opinion from the

1		Attorney General's Chambers on the
2		matter as well.
3	Q:	On what matter?
4	A:	As to whether any assistance can be
5		granted on humanitarian grounds.
6	COMM. BOGLE:	But you have been doing that with number
7		7. But what about 2, 3, 5 and 6?
8	A:	Humanitarian grounds as to whether if
9		any properties were sold for instance
10		whether any of the cash proceeds could
11		be paid to assist with the medical
12		expenses and all that.
13	COMM. BOGLE:	Okay, fine, but in the mean time sell so
14		that at least we will have the cash to
15		help. At least in the mean time
16		something could be done because the
17		properties, lot number 1 is
18		deteriorating. Number 7 from what
19		Mr. Crawford said is not being occupied
20		now because his mother is with him in
21		the States and lots 1, 2, 5, 6 and 7 are
22		there. You know, to me this is just a
23		matter that we seem to be dragging our
24		feet and not helping as I said, the
25		taxpayer. The taxpayer has had to be

1		paying quite a lot of money for the
2		FINSAC thing, quite a lot of money and
3		we have properties sitting down here
4		that could assist in defraying the costs
5		of the taxpayers.
6		Mr. Campbell, I note where you said that
7		some of the properties, the offers that
8		you got were below the forced sale
9		value.
10	A:	Forced sale value.
11	COMM. BOGLE:	I remember when Mr. Hylton came, he said
12		what they went off was to get the best
13		price that the market was willing to
14		pay. Now, you can sit on a piece of
15		property for the next 50 years and
16		nobody offers you the forced sale value,
17		but someone could offer you fifteen
18		percent less and you sell it and get
19		along with it. It is what the market
20		says, it is not what the valuator says,
21		the valuator gives an idea, he gives you
22		an opinion. He says I believe this, but
23		if the market says I am paying that,
24		then you have to sell it to the market.
25		But here you have properties sitting

1 down and saying that well, we get a few 2 offers every now and again, but it is 3 below the forced sale value, while the taxpayer at the same time is paying a 5 whole lot for the amount of money that 6 was used in the intervention. 7 Mr. Campbell, I think that you as the 8 head of FINSAC needs to be more 9 proactive in getting the assets that 10 FINSAC has moving. I mean, earlier in 11 testimony we heard abut some arts that 12 FINSAC has. What conditions are they 13 being maintained in, why aren't we 14 selling them? Why haven't we advertised 15 them? A lot of persons are involved in 16 art and we just having them sitting down 17 there. The taxpayers are paying quite a 18 hefty bill for this intervention, while 19 we are sitting down on assets. The 20 court order was given for these and we 21 defied the court order because court 22 order should be defied and not sell 23 these. And I come back to Lot 1 again 24 where you say that court order given but 25 you can't get to the property. What you

1 mean, Mr. Campbell. The court order was 2 given but you went there and when you 3 went the gate is locked up. Somebody 4 might be living there we don't know. 5 And this is a piece of property that -6 Mr. Campbell, I don't know, but I think that FINSAC needs to really get a move on in trying to - Mr. Hylton when he was 9 here surely gave the impression that 10 really what they wanted to do was to 11 liquidate so that they can move on, 12 liquidate so that they can reduce the 13 debt. But the FINSAC that is there now 14 seems to say why bother to liquidate, 15 one of these days we will sell. We are not in any hurry to liquidate because 16 17 the longer we don't liquidate the longer 18 FINSAC will be around and the longer - I 19 won't go any further. This Mr. Campbell, 20 we need to get this done. Taxpayers, and 21 I come back to that because I am a 22 taxpayer; I don't know if you are one, I 23 assume you are. The taxpayers are going 2.4 to pay a whole lot of money from the 25 budget. And so may I suggest that

1	FINSAC needs to get a move on and sell
2	all of these properties. But I await
3	your explanation as to Item 7. I don't
4	think you can have any good explanation
5	for Items 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6 because those
6	are just simply lots and I do not see
7	Mr. Crawford's mother occupying these
8	five lots because they are just lots.
9	So even if there is an argument about
10	Item 7 regarding her residence and this
11	again, I say based on the evidence
12	before this Commission, I suggest that
13	FINSAC re-think that item. If
14	Mr. Crawford has appealed to the
15	Government, if the Government has put
16	something in writing to FINSAC saying
17	well, we are asking you to hold off,
18	then bring it in front of the
19	Commission, otherwise I am saying that,
20	that doesn't hold water in the
21	Commission here at all that FINSAC is
22	sitting down on properties. And on that
23	basis I would like to also ask what is
24	being done about the sale of the arts,
25	items of art that FINSAC is siting down

1		on as well, what is being done about
2		that?
3	A:	We are in the process of planning an
4		auction for that, Mr. Chairman.
5	COMM. BOGLE:	When last have you had an action for the
6		arts?
7	A:	The last one was probably two years ago.
8	COMM. BOGLE:	And so between two years, what's the
9		effort that was done?
10	MR. MOODIE:	If I may, Mr. Chairman, I think we
11		covered that area already. And I think
12		you gave your direction to Mr. Campbell
13		and Mr. Campbell gave his undertaking at
14		the time you gave your direction to him,
15		and your suggestion to him, that further
16		auction would be considered. That was
17		several weeks ago.
18	COMM. BOGLE:	I just wanted to be sure that, that is
19		being followed through, Mr. Moodie.
20	MR. MOODIE:	Certainly, Mr. Chairman.
21	COMM. BOGLE:	And Mr. Campbell is usually quite
22		capable of answering the questions.
23	MR. MOODIE:	No, but I am just assisting us in making
24		the most efficient use of time because I
25		think we did cover that area

1		exhaustively.
2	COMM. BOGLE:	Leave the time thing to the Commission.
3	MR. MOODIE:	Noted, Chairman.
4	COMM. BOGLE:	Thank you very much.
5	COMM ROSS:	Mr. Campbell, the two companies that
6		were mentioned by Mr. Crawford, you
7		haven't mentioned them here, Jamaica
8		Grande and Blue Cross?
9	A:	They have been included in the extended
10		list that I have that I am preparing
11		now. These were omitted in error.
12	COMM ROSS:	Is there anything you could tell us
13		about them now?
14	A:	Not much. From the file I saw that the
15		Blue Cross was sold for US\$3 Million. I
16		wasn't able to find any further
17		information, but my staff are assisting
18		with the research now. And I am aware
19		that the Jamaica Grande was sold for
20		US\$37.5 Million. FIS owns 49.44 percent
21		of that. I wasn't able to find any
22		information on the net proceeds of sale
23		and that sort of thing. So we are
24		compiling that information, hopefully we
25		will have it before the end of the week.

1	COMM ROSS:	Would you also have information on the
2		valuations?
3	A:	Yes, we will endeavour to get that.
4	COMM ROSS:	Mr. Campbell, when you are bringing the
5		information on the Jamaica Grande you
6		could also bring the information of
7		whatever offers you might have had, you
8		
9	7) .	might have received for the hotel.
9	A:	Will do Mr. Commissioner.
10	MR. MOODIE;	Some of that information, Chairman,
11		would perhaps have already been in the
12		minutes of the Board Meetings which the
13		Commissioners have already been provided
14		with.
15	COMM ROSS:	We still would like an account for it in
16		the similar format to the one that we
17		received in EC7/11A.
18	COMM. BOGLE:	Mr. Campbell, while you are going
19		through, and you are being given
20		additional homework, because we give you
21		additional time and so we are giving you
22		additional homework and this has to do
23		with Holiday Inn. Can you provide us
24		with some more information on the sale
25		of the Holiday Inn, valuations et

1		cetera.
2	A:	That information would have been
3		included in one of the spreadsheets we
4		gave you already, but I will extract it.
5	COMM. BOGLE:	If you can extract that I would
6		appreciate that. All right.
7	MISS CLARKE:	If I may, Mr. Chairman, just a question
8		that is relevant insofar as there is
9		some similar data with respect to one of
10		the witnesses who has appeared before
11		the Commission. I would like to ask in
12		relation to the Fisherman's Point
13		apartment that was sold if you are able
14		to give us any detailed descriptions of
15		these apartments. Were they one
16		bedroom, two bedrooms, penthouse, you
17		know, what was the state of repairs at
18		the time of the sale, could you give us
19		any detail such as those relative to the
20		Fisherman's Point apartment?
21	A:	These in particular?
22	Q:	Yes, the two that were sold, they are
23		items 5 and 6.
24	A:	No.
25	COMM. BOGLE:	If I might just assist. Mr. Campbell

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1		accept the fact that you are late, but
2		not the reason.
3		In your absence FINSAC provided us with
4		two Exhibits EC7/11A, which is assets
5		formally owned by Donovan Crawford and
6		connected parties/companies sold and EC
7		7 11(b) properties owned by Donovan
8		Crawford and connected parties/companies
9		unsold and those have been presented and
10		accepted in evidence.
11	MR. LEVY:	Yes, Mr. Chairman, I got these documents
12		on Thursday afternoon.
13	MRS. PHILLIPS:	Before my friend starts
14	MR. LEVY:	Mr. Chairman
15	COMM. BOGLE:	Just a minute, Mr. levy.
16	MRS. PHILLIPS:	Before my friend starts, could the
17		Commissioner kindly ask him to state his
18		name for the record and who he
19		represents.
20	COMM. BOGLE:	Can you state your name and who you
21		represent. Thank you for that.
22	MR. LEVY:	I didn't hear that.
23	COMM. BOGLE:	Your name and who you represent.
24	MR. LEVY:	Oh, I am sure everybody knows my name.
25		It is George Anthony Levy. I am

1		instructed by the firm G. Anthony Levy
2		and Company. I represent Jean Marie
3		Desulme, Thermo Plastics Jamaica
4		Limited, Donovan Crawford, Alma Crawford
5		and Claudine Crawford. And Mr.
6		Chairman, I give you an undertaking by
7		tomorrow to have sworn complaints filed
8		with you for Alma Crawford and Donovan
9		Crawford. They are being sent by Fedex,
10		but I expect to get them this afternoon.
11		I have seen them on the internet, but I
12		give you that undertaking.
13	COMM. BOGLE:	These sworn statements, are they
14		submissions being put forwarded to the
15		Commission?
16	MR. LEVY:	Pardon me, sir?
17	COMM. BOGLE:	Are these submissions being put
18		forwarded to the Commission?
19	MR. LEVY:	They are sworn statements which are
20		complaints to the Commission.
21	COMM. BOGLE:	About?
22	MR. LEVY:	About FINSAC and the operations of
23		FINSAC and the operations of how FINSAC
24		has dealt with some of their titles,
25		titles which are registered jointly in

1		their names.
2	COMM, BOGLE:	When you get that we would like to see
3		it. As soon as you get that we would
4		like to see it.
5	MR. MOODIE:	Not only to the Commission, but to
6		Counsel representing FINSAC at the very
7		least.
8	MRS. PHILLIPS:	Is there any cut off point?
9	COMM. BOGLE:	There is.
10	MRS. PHILLIPS:	Commissioners, I thought we have already
11		passed there, given that we are now in
12		the last stage?
13	COMM. BOGLE:	That is why I said I want to see it
14		before he presents it.
15	MRS. PHILLIPS:	So can we take it as given then the cut
16		off point has already passed?
17	MR. LEVY:	I can't hear what the lady is saying,
18		sir.
19	COMM. BOGLE:	She is enquiring about the cut off point
20		of the Commission. The reason why I
21		asked is because I suspect that whatever
22		is in that is also part of
23		Mr. Crawford's submissions. Would they
24		be properties that Mr. Crawford would
25		have spoken about?

1	MR. LEVY:	Mr. Crawford would have to do what, sir?
2		Could you please help me, sir.
3	COMM. BOGLE:	May I suggest that as soon as you get it
4		you forwarded it to the Commission and
5		the Commission will decide, make a
6		decision on it.
7	MR. LEVY:	I will hand deliver them to you, sir to
8		the Secretary.
9	COMM. BOGLE:	Thank you.
10	MR. LEVY:	And when I get them by e-mail I will
11		send them to you.
12	COMM. BOGLE:	Thank you very much. Go ahead. Mr.
13		Campbell is here, you requested that
14		Mr. Campbell be here for
15		cross-examination regarding some
16		matters.
17	MR. LEVY:	Mr. Campbell, let's start with this. I
18		was surprised with something that looks
19		like this, but I have now found that
20		three pages are now merged into two. It
21		might take a little more time for me to
22		follow.
23		The property at Sterling Castle,
24		Mr. Campbell, starting with the first
25		item on the list.

1	COMM. BOGLE:	Which of the Exhibits is that?
2	MR. LEVY:	Exhibit EC7/11A.
3	COMM. BOGLE:	Go ahead.
4	MR. LEVY:	Lot 2A and 5 Sterling Castle (DC's
5		residence - 1 holding) two volumes and
6		folios, in whose names were those titles
7		registered?
8	A:	Donovan Crawford.
9	Q:	Alone?
10	A:	Yes.
11	Q:	And that has been held by the Attorney
12		General?
13	A:	That's correct.
14	Q:	Let's go to Lots 1, 2, 5, 6 and 7, in
15		whose names are those titles mentioned?
16	A:	Donovan and Alma Crawford.
17	Q:	Pardon me?
18	A:	Donovan and Alma Crawford.
19	Q:	And who is Alma Crawford?
20	A:	Donovan Crawford's mother.
21	Q:	I see. And these loans have been sold
22		to Jamaican Redevelopment Foundation?
23	A:	Loans?
24	Q:	These securities have been assigned to
25		Jamaican Redevelopment Foundation?

1	A:	No, they have not been.
2	Q:	Pardon me?
3	A:	No, they have not been; but the titles
4		are being held by JRF.
5	Q:	Would you explain why JRF is still
6		holding titles on behalf of FINSAC
7		instead of the Attorney General's
8		Chambers?
9	COMM. BOGLE:	Mr. Levy, you know this document was put
10		in and all of those questions were
11		asked.
12	MR. LEVY:	Pardon me, Mr. Chairman.
13	COMM. BOGLE:	All of those questions were asked before
14		you came here.
15	MR. LEVY:	I didn't hear the answers, sir.
16	COMM. BOGLE:	We were here and you should have been
17		here, Mr. Levy, and we are going to go
18		back over the same thing.
19	MR. LEVY:	But I can't know if they were dealt with
20		before.
21	COMM. BOGLE:	You knew the time that we were to
22		convene, Mr. Levy.
23	MR. LEVY:	Was any debt assigned to Jamaican
24		Redevelopment Foundation, Mr. Campbell?
25	A:	Perhaps you want to extend the question

1		a little.
2	Q:	Pardon me?
3	A:	Perhaps you want to extend the question
4		a little or make it a little more
5		specific then.
6	Q:	You said Jamaican Redevelopment
7		Foundation were holding the titles for
8		those five properties?
9	A:	Yes.
10	Q:	Did Jamaican Redevelopment Foundation
11		have a debt assigned to them?
12	COMM. BOGLE:	Mr. Levy, quite frankly I don't see that
13		we really should go over what we spent
14		all this morning doing. You may look -
15		as far as I am concerned, the transcript
16		is what you would have to work with at
17		this time. All of these here we went
18		through and questions were asked about
19		them. For instance, the matter that you
20		are asking about that was explained that
21		the titles went across to JRF in error.
22		They are there, they are not supporting
23		any loan or anything to JRF. So we went
24		through all of this.
25	MR. LEVY:	But I wasn't here, sir.

1	COMM. BOGLE:	But what I am saying I am not going to
2		continue to have a repeat of what we had
3		this morning because the transcript, you
4		may have a copy of that, but we really
5		would be wasting time for you to go
6		through both lists when we have gone
7		through them with Mr. Campbell. So I am
8		not going to really have a repeat of
9		this morning. So may I suggest,
10		Mr. Levy, as soon as the transcript is
11		available you will get a copy of it and
12		to the extent - Mr. Campbell will be
13		returning and to the extent that you
14		have any additional questions, then you
15		may put them to Mr. Campbell when he
16		returns. But at this point these two
17		Exhibits, we have gone through them.
18	MR. LEVY:	Mr. Chairman, I understand what you are
19		saying. May I ask a question of you,
20		sir?
21	COMM. BOGLE:	Sure.
22	MR. LEVY:	Has Mr. Campbell said whether Alma
23		Crawford owed any money to FINSAC?
24	COMM. BOGLE:	That question was not asked.
25	MR. LEVY:	It was not asked?

1	COMM. BOGLE:	No.
2	MR. LEVY:	May I ask that question, sir?
3	COMM. BOGLE:	You may.
4	MR. LEVY:	Mr. Campbell, do your records show Mr.
5		Crawford's 91 year old mother owing any
6		money to FINSAC?
7	A:	Alma Crawford didn't owe FINSAC any
8		money.
9	Q:	Alma Crawford never what?
10	A:	Never owed FINSAC.
11	Q:	But you are holding the titles because
12		Don Crawford is in title with her?
13	A:	That is correct. And that's why you will
1.4		see if you look on the other page, Item
15		Number 5 when the property was sold we
16		gave her a portion of the proceeds, item
17		number 5 on the next Exhibit.
18	Q:	Item Number 5, 50% of proceeds paid to
19		Alma Crawford.
20	A:	Yes.
21	Q:	Okay. Were any other properties sold
22		which she jointly owned?
23	A:	That's the only one.
24	Q:	I ask the question, Mr. Campbell, what
25		was the authority by which FINSAC sold

1		the property with 50% interest is owned
2		by a third party who is now struggling
3		with obligations to you?
4	COMM. BOGLE:	Mr. Levy
5	MR. LEVY:	I am asking the question of you, Mr.
6		Chairman.
7	COMM. BOGLE:	I am asking you to take my suggestion
8		that as soon as the transcript is
9		available, we will make a copy available
10		to you. You may go through the
11		transcript and when Mr. Campbell returns
12		if there are any questions regarding
13		these two Exhibits that were not
14		answered you may ask them. You have
15		asked another question that was answered
16		this morning.
17	MR. LEVY:	I can't know, sir, and so I have to ask.
18	COMM. BOGLE:	This is why again I am suggesting Mr.
19		Levy, that as soon as the transcript is
20		available you will receive a copy or you
21		may collect a copy and you may go
22		through that and any question that you
23		have that was not answered, you may put
24		it to Mr. Campbell when he returns?
25	MR. LEVY:	Any question that was not answered

1		adequately, Mr. Chairman?
2	COMM. BOGLE:	Yes, Mr. Levy.
3	MR. LEVY:	Yes, Mr. Chairman, is Mr. Campbell
4		coming back this afternoon?
5	COMM BOGLE:	No, and I do not think you would have
6	•	gotten the transcript by then.
7	MR. LEVY:	There are other matters to be dealt
8		with.
9	COMM BOGLE:	You have other matters to be dealt with?
10	MR. LEVY:	Yes. Let me start by saying I don't
11		know what he said about Thermo-Plastics.
12		maybe I should ask you this question Mr.
13		Chairman. When Mr. Campbell gave
14		evidence before Thermo-Plastic's titles
15		were not on the list of titles sold by
16		FINSAC. He promised to investigate and
17		report back, have you received that
18		report today?
19	COMM BOGLE:	No.
20	Q:	Mr. Campbell, you recall that?
21	A:	Yes, I do.
22	MR. MOODIE:	Might I interject, Chairman? In
23		relation to Thermo-Plastic Mr. Levy
24		wrote to us reminding us that we had
25		promised to send over the Thermo-Plastic

1		files to Mr. Hylton and we indeed sent
2		over all those files, at all the Thermo-
3		
		Thermo-Plastics files, and I think in
4		Mr. Levy's letter he had indicated that
5		he would expect Mr. Hylton to be in a
6		position to answer all questions in
7		relation to Thermo-Plastics once those
8		files were handed over.
9	MR. LEVY:	That's secondary, Mr. Chairman. The
10		fact is, an undertaking was given by
11		Mr. Campbell to produce evidence
12		required which was omitted.
13		Mr. Campbell had given to this
14		Commission a complete list, a complete
15		list of all the properties sold and we
16		found not only Thermo-Plastics but there
17		were others which evidence has been
18		produced had been sold that were not on
19		the list. So it was an undertaking to
20		provide that to you but Mr. Hylton is
21		not involved in that. I request you send
22		the files to Mr. Hylton, make the files
23		available to Mr. Hylton so he doesn't
24		have alzeimers disease when he comes
25		next time.

1	MR. GARCIA:	I object.
2	MR. LEVY:	I don't care if you object. He kept
3		forgetting everything.
4	COMM BOGLE:	Mr. Levy, you like to say we are here to
5		get to the truth. Well we will not get
6		to the truth without mutual respect for
7		everyone and therefore I would ask that
8		we all treat each other with mutual
9		respect; the attorneys treat the
10		witnesses and other persons with respect
11		and other persons treat the attorneys
12		with respect. And therefore I am going
13		to ask you not to continue to call names
14		and allude to persons in a derogatory
15		manner but that you will ask the
16		questions of the witnesses that will
17		provide us with information.
18	MR. LEVY:	Mr. Chairman, I will be polite in my
19		questions but respect is not something
20		commanded, but something earned and
21		where a witness is not a witness of
22		truth I do not have respect for that
23		witness.
24	COMM BOGLE:	Mr. Levy, I'll not go into an argument
25		with you about that, I will simply ask

1		that in future you treat the witnesses
		-
2		with respect. Go ahead, sir.
3	MR. LEVY:	Back to my original question. Mr.
4		Campbell, you undertook to bring to this
5		Commission details of the titles which
6		were transferred by FINSAC which had
7		been owned by Thermo-Plastics Jamaica
8		Limited. There were also some other
9		titles, I didn't represent the clients
10		there, which you included in your
11		undertaking to provide that list to the
12		Commission so that the list of titles
13		sold could be complete, not incomplete
14		which has been represented to be
15		complete.
16	A:	I am not aware of any such undertaking,
17		Mr. Levy. What I was asked to do was to
18		include on the list the properties of
19		Thermo-Plastics which were sold. My
20		position on it is those properties were
21		not sold by FINSAC and that is why I
22		omitted them the list.
23	MR. LEVY:	Mr. Chairman, there is evidence before
24		this Commission that the transfers of
25		those two parcels of land were sold by

1		Refin and were signed by Patrick Hylton
2		as Managing Director, which is a
3		complete mis-statement.
4	COMM BOGLE:	Mr. Levy, I must agree with you that in
5		this Commission so far when it comes to
6		disposition of properties, etc., all of
7		the properties that were disposed of by
8		Refin and FINSAC came under the overall
9		umbrella of FINSAC and that we have not
10		really tried to differentiate between
11		Refin and FINSAC in the disposition of
12		properties so therefore, Mr. Campbell, I
13		do not think that, that is a fair answer
14		to the question.
15	A:	My reason for saying that, Mr. Chairman,
16		the assets of Thermo-Plastics were sold
17		by the Receiver. In the process of
18		doing so he required the transfer of the
19		property, and yes Refin signed the
20		transfer but it was the assets that were
21		sold, it was not like it was just that
22		property. That is why I have not
23		included it on the list so I don't know
24		if that is enough distinction.
25	MR. LEVY:	A property is sold by a transfer which

1		was signed, both properties transfers
2		under the seal of Refin Trust were
3		signed by Patrick Hylton and somebody
4		else. These are in evidence, we can
5		find them. So let us not play games
6		here, the property was sold by Refin
7		which is part of the general FINSAC
8		nomenclature that was used. Therefore
9		it is part of the list of the properties
10		sold by FINSAC and ought to be brought
11		to the Commission to complete that list.
12	MR. CAMPBELL:	Mr. Chairman, as I said it was the
13		assets of Thermo-Plastics that were
14		sold. If the Commission wishes we could
15		provide a copy of the agreement for sale
16		which would list all the assets
17		including those properties. We could
18		provide that to the Commission but I am
19		saying, it is in the process of selling
20		the assets that there was a requirement
21		for transfer of property to be done and
22		Refin signed the transfer.
23	MR. LEVY:	Transfer says, in consideration of the
24		sum of so many dollars we hereby
25		transfer. If that's not a sale what is

1		a sale? Those documents are before the
2		Commission, they are exhibits in Mr.
3		Desulme's evidence and they have been
4		put to Patrick Hylton already, that's
5		the signature. They were put to Mr.
6		Campbell also.
7	COMM BOGLE:	So we do have the information?
8	MR. LEVY:	You have information that a transfer
9		signed by Patrick Hylton was sold at,
10		two of them, which you have established
11		by producing the Stamp Commissioner's
12		valuation, they were sold at gross under
13		values. But Mr. Campbell is playing
1.4		games. They were transferred by FINSAC.
15	COMM BOGLE:	Mr. Campbell?
16	A:	Yes, Mr. Chairman.
17	COMM BOGLE:	Could we have that included on your
18		list?
19	A:	Copy of the Sale Agreement?
20	COMM BOGLE:	Details of the properties sold to
21		complete your list. I am sure you have
22		the information.
23	A:	I don't know that the information would
24		be available in the format that we
25		provided everything else in the sense

1		that - but I'll look to see what we
2		have. Bottom line is, as I said it was
3		the assets of Thermo-Plastics that were
4		sold.
5	COMM BOGLE:	I am sure Mr. Campbell, that you can out
6		of those documents pick out the relevant
7		information. I am sure you can.
8	A:	I'll check.
9	COMM BOGLE:	Mr. Levy?
10	MR. LEVY:	Yes, sir. Mr. Chairman, has Mr.
11		Campbell told who Dean Crawford is?
12	COMM BOGLE:	No.
13	MR. LEVY:	I see item 22 on the list of properties
14		owned by Donovan Crawford and connected
15		parties/companies unsold, item #19, DC
16		and Donovan Dean Crawford.
17	A:	I do not know who that is.
18	Q:	I am sorry, line 22, lot 19.
19	A:	I do not know who that is, Mr. Levy, I
20		suspect it Donovan Crawford's son.
21	Q:	Speak into the mike, please.
22	A:	I do not who Donovan Dean Crawford is, I
23		suspect it is Donovan Crawford son.
24	Q:	You suspect it is?
25	A:	Yes, I would.

1	Q:	That is still being held by the Attorney
2		General's Chamber.
3		Mr. Chairman, some of this has been
4		filled out with information that I never
5		had before so it takes me a little time.
6		How many antique American cars did
7		Mr. Crawford have which were seized by
8		FINSAC, FIS, the Receiver whatever?
9	A:	I am aware of four antique cars; you
10		specifically said American, I suspect it
11		probably just the Buick that was
12		American because that one was left hand
13		drive.
14	Q:	Suspect what, sir?
15	A:	You were asking how many American cars,
16		I am saying there were four antique
17		cars.
18	Q:	What happened all four of them?
19	A:	One sold, the Buick, and the other
20		three are being held.
21	Q:	Are they garaged or they are left out to
22		rust in the rain?
23	A:	We have a tarpaulin over them.
24	Q:	The '31 Buick motor car was sold for
25		\$676,000?

1	A:	In your absence - I could just give you
2		the additional information, it was an
3		error.
4	Q:	\$801,000?
5	A:	Yes.
6	Q:	And in US dollars how much is that?
7	A:	At today's rate or two years ago when it
8		was sold?
9	Q:	Today's rate. And this was sold in 2007
10		so it is not that different.
11	A:	US\$9,000.
12	Q:	Was a valuation made of this property
13		before it was sold?
14	A:	Yes sir.
15	Q:	And when was that valuation made, Mr.
16		Campbell?
17	A:	The valuation was done about August,
18		2006 and the sale was shortly after.
19	Q:	The valuation was made about August?
20	A:	2006.
21	Q:	Can you produce to us a copy of that
22		valuation?
23	A:	Absolutely.
24	MR. MOODIE:	I am just assisting Mr. Levy that we
25		indicated we would be sending the

1		valuations in respect of EC7/11A over to
2		the Commission this afternoon.
3	MR. LEVY:	Do you know the name of the valuator,
4		Mr. Campbell?
5	A:	MSC McCain on Lady Musgrave.
6	Q:	And what's his qualifications to value
7		an antique car?
8	A:	I cannot answer that.
9	Q:	I look forward to seeing that valuation
10		when we'll take that further, Mr.
11		Campbell. And to whom was the car sold?
12	A:	Mr. Levy, I will need to get that
13		information to provide to you and the
14		Commission. I realise that you have sent
15		us another letter asking us to provide
16		details of all the purchasers, the
17		original letter did not require that, I
18		did not request that so I have committed
19		to the Commissioners to extend the
20		spreadsheet to include a column for that
21		information.
22	MR. MOODIE:	This last letter you received from Mr.
23		Levy, when was it received?
24	A:	It was received on Thursday last week. I
25		know it is dated Tuesday but I got it on

1		Thursday.
2	MR. LEVY:	Have you received valuations of the
3		other motor cars?
4	A:	Valuations were obtained for the four of
5		them in August, 2006.
6	Q:	And so can you provide to the Commission
7		and to me copies of all the valuations?
8	A:	I don't know the relevance of those at
9		this time but I'll provide it.
10	MR. LEVY:	Mr. Chairman, did Mr. Campbell tell the
11		Commission who or what Shape Corporation
12		Limited was? That appears in line 27.
13	COMM BOGLE:	No.
14	Q:	Can you tell us, Mr. Campbell?
15	A:	Shape is one of the companies that was
16		under the control of Century National
17		Bank so at the point when FIS intervened
18		this company was taken over.
19	Q:	Would you explain what you mean by under
20		the control of Century National Bank?
21	A:	Let me say owned by Century National
22		Bank.
23	Q:	Century National Bank owned the shares?
24	A:	Shape Corporation, yes.
25	MR. MOODIE:	Might I just interject a second?

1		Attached to Mr. Crawford's statement
2		where he lists the CNB Holdings Group, I
3		see an entity there called Sharp
4		
		Corporation.
5	MR. CAMPBELL:	It is supposed to be Shape so probably
6		that's the error.
7	MR. MOODIE:	It is identified as Shaw Park and it is
8		said that Century group was a hundred
9		percent owner. It is attached to Mr.
10		Crawford's statement.
11	MR. LEVY:	I thank you, Mr. Moodie.
12	MR. MOODIE:	You are most welcome.
13	MR. LEVY:	You can be helpful when you are ready.
14	MR. MOODIE:	When relevant.
15	MR. LEVY:	At the risk of being told the question
16		has been answered, I have to ask it
17		anyway, Mr. Chairman, because I now
18		realise that all of them have not been
19		asked, and please answer me before, even
20		if you think I shouldn't ask it.
21		Item 4 on EC7/11A. Land Part of Runaway
22		Bay. In the remarks column 50% due to
23		CC but withheld for fees. Was the
24		question asked as to what fees you are
25		talking about?

1	COMM BOGLE:	Yes, it was.
2	MR. MOODIE:	And it was separated; the fees due to
3		FINSAC and the other fees which were
4		due.
5	MR. LEVY:	Mr. Campbell?
6	A:	Yes, sir.
7	Q:	Have you produced to the corporation
8		professional valuations of each of the
9		properties which FINSAC has sold?
10	A:	We have it to give to the Commission
11		this afternoon.
12	Q:	Pardon me.
13	A:	We have the valuations to provide to the
14		Commission this afternoon.
15	MR. MOODIE:	In fact Mr. Levy has already been
16		provided with those valuations.
17	MR. LEVY:	Thank you for reminding me. On Thursday
18		afternoon I propose to cross-examine
19		Mr. Campbell on some of those
20		valuations. For example, Mr. Chairman,
21		I see where one property was sold for
22		\$12 million and a mortgage was taken to
23		pay for it for \$12.5 million. We need
24		to look a little further on those. I got
25		some of the titles but it's a mass of

1		documents, I only got the information
2		Thursday, I got the titles Friday, I
3		have not the chance to do a full and
4		complete analysis. I have my clerk at
5		the Titles Office now getting further
6		documents because I am seeing mortgages
7		dated long after Mr. Crawford left. I
8		don't know who they were signed by. I
9		am investigating it, I am going to be
10		doing a forensic investigation of them
11		because there is criminality going on.
12		Have you provided to the Commission yet
13		Mr. Campbell, a valuation of land part
14		of Runaway Bay, St. Ann, which was
15		transferred in February, 2007; Volume
16		1384, Folio 457 to Neville Anthony Marsh
17		and Maxine Denise Marsh?
18	MR. MOODIE:	Chairman, if I may? It is item 4 on
19		EC7/11A and forms part of the documents
20		which Mr. Levy already has been provided
21		with which we will be providing to the
22		Commission.
23	MR. CAMPBELL:	Mr. Chairman, I think I should probably
24		make a correction. Earlier I was asked
25		what these dates are, I suggested it was

1		the date of the sale. It seems that it
2		really is the date when we got the net
3		proceeds. Now that Mr. Levy mentioned
4		that, that property was transferred in
5		February '07 these dates could be the
6		dates of the net proceeds.
7	MR. MOODIE:	That would be column H on EC7/11A to
8		read date of receipt of net proceeds.
9	MR. LEVY:	Just to be certain Mr. Campbell, Volume
10		1409, Folio 696, and Volume 1409, Folio
11		684 the properties at Paddington Terrace
12		and Barbican Road. Could you tell me
13		whether or not you had a valuation on
14		that?
15	MR. CAMPBELL:	That's the question, whether or not you
16		had a valuation on that? We have a
17		valuation for the Paddington Terrace
18		property but those Volume and Folio
19		number that you mentioned are not what I
20		am accustomed to.
21	Q:	Sorry, Mr. Campbell, please speak into
22		the mike.
23	A:	We do have a valuation and my counsel
24		advised ME that you have in fact gotten
25		a copy for Paddington Terrace, but I am

1		saying the Volume and Folio number that
2		you just quoted are not familiar to me.
3		I am aware of 492 and 32 and 33.
4	Q:	Mr. Campbell, maybe I will give you the
5		explanation because these titles were
6		issued in the name of the new owners. I
7		have sent for the document to show the
8		chain of title but they are not
9		available here.
10	A:	Okay.
11	Q:	Who did it valuations?
12	A:	The valuations were done by Allison
13		Pitter and Company and I have committed
14		to extended this spreadsheet to include
15		that information, and of course you
16		already have a copy of the valuation so
17		you would have seen it.
18	Q:	How long before the sale was the
19		valuation done?
20	COMM BOGLE:	Mr. Levy, that again was asked and we
21		were told that we would be provided with
22		the valuation. All of the items on
23		EC7/11A we have requested valuations for
24		them all and have been promised them.
25		And I understand that you do have them.
		andorbeand char you do have them.

1		you are fortunate enough in that you do
2		have the valuations already.
3	MR. LEVY:	I have a bunch of papers sir, I have not
4		been able to review them, sir.
5	MR. MOODIE:	Chairman, in fairness, I think any
6		request for documents, in complying with
7		them hereon we will provide to the
8		Commission and perhaps thereafter copy
9		the person who requests.
10	COMM BOGLE:	That would be preferable.
11	MR. LEVY:	Mr. Chairman, I seem to recall and I
12		would like to remind Mr. Campbell, if my
13		memory serves me right Mr. Cam[bell was
14		also required and had undertaken to
15		produce to the Commission copies of an
16		advertisements of properties of
17		Thermo-Plastics factories prior to the
18		sale.
19	MR. MOODIE:	Didn't Mr. Downer give information in
20		relation to the advertisement or lack
21		thereof, as to the reasons?
22	MR. LEVY:	I can help you with that. Mr. Downer
23		said the business was sold he didn't say
24		it was advertised.
25	MR. MOODIE:	He spoke to why he did not see it fit to

1		get valuations because it was the
2		business as whole that he was selling.
3		I think Mr. Downer's evidence was clear
4		on that; that he did not commission
5		valuation of different pieces of
6		property or assets which may have made
7		up Thermo-Plastics.
8	MR. LEVY:	With due respect, Mr. Chairman,
9		properties were sold by Refin Trust
10		under the Powers of Sale contained in a
11		mortgage and there are certain legal
12		requirements before a mortgagee can
13		lawfully exercise his power of sale,
14		that what he ought to do I am sure
15		you can get good legal advice from on
16		your left, Mr. Chairman, but one of them
17		is appraisal, independent sale,
18		advertisement, independent third parties
19		and my question to Mr. Campbell, because
20		when he came the last time he said that
21		the file was with the Attorneys and that
22		is why he didn't have that but he was
23		asked to get the valuations if any, made
24		by Refin Trust at the time or prior to
25		exercising their Power of Sale. I repeat

1		the request, Chairman.
2	MR. MOODIE:	My understanding, Chairman, is that the
3		properties were sold by the
4		Receiver/Manager so perhaps in seeking
5		out that further advice that Mr. Levy
6		commends to the Commission that you
7		could look into that issue as well.
8		As far as I know those issues are still
9		the subject of court action going on.
10	MR. LEVY:	These documents have not yet been
11		disclosed if they exist and we ask that
12		they be disclosed to the Commission and
13		not be hidden.
14	COMM BOGLE:	Mr. Campbell, do you know of any
15		valuation that was done on the
16		properties?
17	A:	I am not aware of any.
18	COMM BOGLE:	Can you just check your records to see
19		if you I find any such valuation?
20	A:	I repeat the sale of the assets
21	COMM BOGLE:	I heard you but could you please check
22		your files.
23	MR. MOODIE:	And certainly the Board Minutes which we
24		have submitted to this Commission will
25		assist.

1	COMM BOGLE:	Mr. Levy, Mr. Campbell will try to
2		ascertain one, if there were any
3		valuations. If there were he will try
4		to ensure that we get a copy of it.
5	MR. LEVY:	And also the advertisements of the
6		properties being sold, Mr. Chairman?
7	COMM BOGLE:	He will do what he can to find whatever
8		information on those and provide us with
9		the information.
10	MR. LEVY:	I am obliged.
11	MR. MOODIE:	FINSAC records.
12	MR. LEVY:	I am reminding the Commission, Mr.
13		Campbell and my good friends on my right
14		that Mr. Patrick Hylton made it quite
15		clear what the policy and practice of
16		FINSAC was with regard to advertisement
17		and valuation prior to sale and if that
18		practice and policy was not carried out
19		the Commission needs to know.
20	COMM BOGLE:	And this matter is before the Courts,
21		still?
22	MR. LEVY:	Yes, at a point where disclosure is
23		required. So disclosure here of the
24		relevant fact is not anything wild or
25		imaginary.

1	COMM BOGLE:	Mr. Levy, all I wanted for the records,
2		I ask that question for the records.
3	MR. LEVY:	And for the records I said that this is
4		a point at which disclosure legally
5		ought to be made of all the relevant
6		facts including that if they exist.
7	COMM BOGLE:	We are at one with that, Mr. Levy.
8	MR. LEVY:	Pardon me, sir.
9	COMM BOGLE:	We are at one on that point.
10	MR. LEVY:	We are ad idem.
11	MR. MOODIE:	So Mr. Levy should have them subject to
12		the disclosure process then.
13	MR. GARCIA:	Is Mr. Levy saying that an Order for
14		Disclosure has been made in those
15		proceedings? I am just wondering. He is
16		referring to it being at the stage where
17		disclosure would be made and I am not
18		certain what to make of that, whether he
19		is saying it is at the stage where it
20		would apply or is he saying it is at the
21		stage where an order has been made.
22	COMM BOGLE:	Just a minute. Mr. Garcia has a
23		question. Can you put the question, Mr.
24		Garcia.
25	MR. LEVY:	Is Mr. Garcia involved in FINSAC?

1	COMM BOGLE:	He represents Mr. Patrick Hylton.
2	MR. LEVY:	Then if the question relates to Mr.
3		Hylton then it will be entertained by
4		me.
5	COMM BOGLE:	No, Mr. Hylton comes to this Commission
6		as a part of FINSAC, as a previous head
7		of FINSAC and if it affects FINSAC
8	MR. LEVY:	But he forgot half of what happened.
9	MR. GARCIA:	Commissioner, if I may? My friend has
10		spent quite some time asking Mr. Hylton
11		various questions Thermo-Plastics. Now
12		if it is that he believes that Mr.
13		Hylton's evidence has no relevance to
14		the issue of Thermo-Plastics then I
15		suppose I need not pursue this and at
16		the same time I would think he should
17		not appropriately continue that
18		cross-examination of my client in
19		relation to the issue. But if he thinks
20		that my client's evidence is relevant to
21		the issue, it seems to me that I should
22		appropriately be able to ask the
23		question and have Mr. Levy answer it.
24	MR. LEVY:	What is more relevant from Mr. Hylton's
25		evidence is what he forgot or doesn't

1		remember.
2	COMM. BOGLE:	Mr. Levy, I am going to ask Mr. Garcia
3		to repeat the question because I think
4		it's a question that is important for
5		the Commission, so I am going to ask him
6		to repeat.
7	MR. GARCIA:	My question again, sir, was whether or
8		not Mr. Levy in the course of his
9		dissertation a few minutes ago commented
10		on the matter being at a stage, I think
11		a stage at which discovery would be
12		made
13	MR. LEVY:	Disclosure.
14	MR. GARCIA:	Disclosure, sorry, would be made and my
15		query related to whether or not it's the
16		case that an order for disclosure, an
17		inspection had been made in the Supreme
18		Court?
19	MR. LEVY:	Other than the order saying that
20		disclosure had been made at a certain
21		date, there is no specific order for
22		disclosure of this. Does that answer
23		your question?
24	MR. GARCIA:	I am understanding that answer to be no,
25		no order has been made for disclosure

1		and inspection in the proceedings.
2	MR. LEVY:	Not yet.
3	MR. GARCIA:	Thank you.
4	MR. LEVY:	I move on Mr. Chairman. Maybe I can ask
5		Mr. Campbell this question.
6	COMM. BOGLE:	Okay, at this time therefore,
7		Mr. Levy
8	MR. LEVY:	I have one more question, can I ask one
9		more question?
10	COMM. BOGLE:	One question and then we will have
11		lunch.
12	MR. LEVY:	Are you familiar with the name Derrick
13		Edmond Anthony Rose, Mr. Campbell.
14	A:	I know Derrick Rose, I don't know if
15		it's the same person.
16	Q:	Well, tell us what you know about
17		Derrick Rose?
18	A:	There was a former staff of FINSAC by
19		the name of Derrick Rose, I don't know
20		if it's the same one you are referring
21		to here.
22	Q:	And that same Derrick Rose now works
23		with JRF up to recently, until recently,
24		to your knowledge?
25	A:	Until recently.

1	Q:	So you understand why my eyes prop up
2		when I see Derrick Rose and Peter Andrew
3		Rose as joint tenants, bought for
4		\$1,250,000 Jamaican dollars Mr.
5		Campbell?
6	MR. MOODIE:	Could counsel see that document?
7		Counsel has not had sight of that
8		document that Mr. Levy is referring to.
9	COMM. BOGLE:	Mr. Levy the document that you have
10		there, can we have a copy of the
11		document that you have.
12	MR. LEVY:	That is my copy, sir, but I can ask him
13		questions on it.
14	COMM. BOGLE:	It's not in evidence.
15	MR. LEVY:	I will undertake to give to secretary if
16		you wish to enter it as an exhibit or I
17		bring it back Friday.
18	COMM. BOGLE:	Well, we were going to adjourn until 2
19		o'clock today bearing in mind that you
20		have additional questions or would you
21		rather to have a look at the transcripts
22		before you have the additional
23		questions, I am giving you the option.
24	MR. LEVY:	Mr. DePeralto suggested that he might
25		bring back Mr. Campbell on Friday, let's

1		bring him on Friday and I have copy of a
2		whole heap of documents for you.
3	COMM. BOGLE:	Therefore, we will adjourn now until
4		tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock when
5		Mr. Patrick Hylton is supposed to be
6		here, tomorrow at 2 o'clock and that's
7		2:00 p.m. Mr. Hylton will be here and on
8		Friday we will not have a sitting on
9		Thursday, we will not have a sitting on
10		Thursday, but on Friday Mr. Campbell
11		will be back.
12	MR. MOODIE:	Might I ask formally that Mr. Levy make
13		available to counsel copies of the
14		documents which he intends to put to
15		Mr. Campbell which are not yet exhibits
16		in this matter so that we could take
17		instruction?
18	COMM. BOGLE:	So endorsed, Mr. Levy you promise to
19		provide us with all the information
20	MR. LEVY:	On Friday morning.
21	COMM. BOGLE:	If you could provide it before.
22	MR. LEVY:	Mr. Chairman, my copying machine doesn't
23		work that fast and it is a whole heap of
24		them. If I were to do it now, I don't
25		have all of them, I just sorted out what

1		I would put to him, it is in a bundle of
2		documents but it will be provided to my
3		friend.
4	COMM. BOGLE:	You will bring enough copies on Friday?
5	MR. LEVY:	I will.
6	MR. MOODIE:	Mr. Chairman, I wish to avoid the
7		scenario which you addressed earlier
8		which is counsel putting a document and
9		then Mr. Campbell having to go and do
10		further research on that document, so I
11		invite Mr. Levy to provide us with
12		copies of documents prior to
13		Mr. Campbell returning before this
14		Commission so we can take instructions
15		and be prepared to answer questions in
16		relation to those documents.
17	MR. LEVY:	I didn't know we had to take
18		instructions to be prepared to answer
19		questions, I think that questions need
20		to be answered by the witness
21		truthfully.
22	MR. MOODIE:	Maybe there is nothing to answer.
23	COMM. BOGLE:	We will not belabour the point. Okay, so
24		we adjourn until tomorrow evening at
25		2:00 p.m.

ADJOURNMENT
